Announcing the Early Childhood Education Fund

and Sharon Abrams
established the
Fulcrum Early
Childhood Education
Fund in December

2017. Ever since the Abrams developed the West Coast Paper Scholarship Fund 15 years ago, they have been inspired by the impact that academic scholarships have had on the lives of young people. Nearly a decade ago, the couple started discussing creating another fund, also focused on education—a personal passion. They began talking with educators and parents to better understand how a new type of fund could be best used. Without exception, everyone agreed that investing in early education would yield critical results.

The Abrams partnered with the Seattle Foundation to increase awareness of the Fulcrum Foundation and to encourage support of their newly created endowment. Through this process, Dick and Sharon came up with the Fulcrum Early Childhood Education Fund, "If we are going to help society in general, across the spectrum of financial need, ethnicity, and more, Catholic schools are leading the way."

"In Catholic schools, students are given an anchor in life—a moral compass," says Dick Abrams.
"Religion is important to us personally, but it is not the reason that we feel so strongly about Catholic school systems. You do not have to be Catholic to attend and benefit."

The Fulcrum Early Childhood Education Fund will focus on tuition assistance, facilities grants, assessment programs, teacher education/certification training, curriculum materials, and toddler programs.

Kaitlyn O'Leary, Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum,

Instruction, Early Learning, Government Programs, for the Office for Catholic Schools states, "The amount of data indicating the positive effects of early childhood education on children's physical, mental, and emotional health as well as economic security and overall success later in life is astounding. Investing in early childhood education for our archdiocesan schools will not only help our schools better prepare students for kindergarten, but will yield fruits well beyond students' early years. I am so excited to expand the Catholic early education options available to families in western Washington. This fund will allow us to open more early childhood programs, expand existing programs, and continue to strengthen and enhance our programs, grounding them in our Catholic faith."

To Olympia!

lanuary 30 was a special day for Jover 150 students who travelled to Olympia, Washington, to attend "Catholic Schools Day at the Capitol." Representing Washington State Catholic schools, the students, teachers and administrators spent the day in Olympia visiting their lawmakers and learning more about legislation to improve school safety. Kristin Dixon, Superintendent of Catholic Schools in the Archdiocese of Seattle, testified about Senate Bill 5514, a proposal to notify all schools public and private—when there is an emergency.

The event, organized by the Washington State Catholic Conference (WSCC), was among many activities taking place for our Catholic schools during Catholic Schools Week.

"It was very special to see so many of our students in uniform walking around the state capitol interacting with Washington State policy makers," said Fulcrum Interim Executive Director, Julie Coleman. Lieutenant-Governor Cyrus Habib, Senator Lisa Wellman, chair of the Early Learning and K-12 Education Committee, and Chris Reykdal, Superintendent of Public Instruction, were three

of the many legislators who presented. "We wanted to share the good news of Catholic schools with policymakers," said Joe Sprague, Executive Director of the WSCC. "It is important for key policymakers to hear the positive story about Catholic schools. It is essential that they understand how inclusive our schools are, including for those with limited economic means, and the significant academic achievement and community support Catholic schools provide."

There are 100 Catholic schools in Washington State, educating over 28,000 students.

Celebration of Light: Cancelled

On February 8, 2019, the Fulcrum Foundation made the unprecedented decision to cancel the 2019 Celebration of Light. The National Weather Service was calling for a blizzard, and snow had already started falling to the north. Due to the safety risks associated with the snow storm and in consideration of attendees traveling for the evening from as far away as Bellingham and Vancouver, the decision was made to cancel.

The last time Seattle experienced a snow event similar to this year's was 1962. The 2019 snow storm impacted Seattle's neighborhoods and communities in different ways, and forced the cancellation of Fulcrum Foundation's critical fundraising event.

The money raised during the event represents nearly half of what the foundation distributes in tuition assistance each year. "When we made the difficult decision to cancel the event, we were in the process of awarding over two million dollars in tuition assistance grants to over 1,500 students for the 2019/20 school year. The award letters were mailed out at the end of February. Well over half of this money was raised at last year's Celebration of Light," said Julie Coleman, Fulcrum Interim Executive Director.

The response from the community has been extraordinary, sending donations to counteract those lost the night of the event. Schools and parishes have communicated to their individual communities asking for support. There has been an increase of new donors, and many dedicated donors have made gifts in support of our three core programs: tuition assistance, school partnerships, and leadership initiatives.

This is a defining moment for Fulcrum and for our entire community.

Together, the community has ensured that Fulcrum's programs will not be adversely impacted next year.

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
